### What do we know and what are we trying to find out?

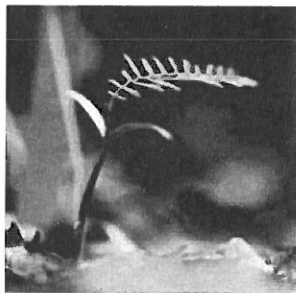
A small puppy grows into a big dog. A tiny seed sprouts a seedling, which grows into a giant sequoia tree.



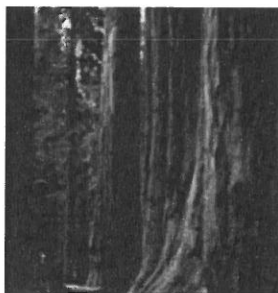
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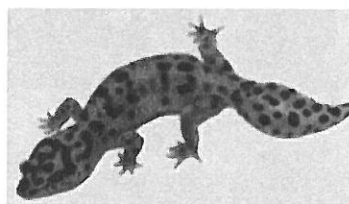
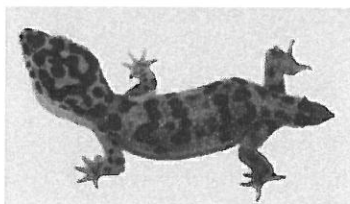
